CUB SCOUT PACK MEETINGS

The information presented here is not intended to replace BSA guidance but to augment it from real life experiences as Cubmaster for three years. I intend to discuss Planning, Room Organization, Den Assignments, and the Basic Pack Meeting.

Planning: August is a great time to plan the up coming year. Plan each month from September through May or perhaps June depending on the school year. The BSA magazine "Scouter" and other BSA material are great recourses and you should make use of them often.

Pack meeting planning is simplified, given that certain months lend themselves readily to seasonal themes. Months such as November with Thanksgiving; December with Christmas; February with Blue and Gold; and another month set aside as a fundraiser. Another month is needed for Pinewood Derby and the last month is for promotion recognitions. This leaves but three months to create a theme.

A fundraiser event that worked well for me was a Dad-and-Lad cake auction. The Cub scout and his dad (or guardian, grandfather, friend, etc) would bake a cake, brownies, cookies, etc and deliver them to the pack meeting to be auctioned off by a professional auctioneer. The auctioneer's musical prattle is new and exciting for most boys. Plus the experience the scout's experience of working with dad to create a masterpiece of culinary delight is reward itself. Many of these masterpieces look like Army tanks (camouflage green and gun turret included), Battle ships, football fields, airplanes, computers, chessboard, and the list goes on. Invariably the family that brought the masterpiece bids on it to take it home yet other families, prodded by their scout, also bids on it and great fun is had by all.

The reason for a fundraiser is to pay for the awards and advancement pens and patches the scouts earn throughout the year. I also bought, from these funds, next year's books and presented the scout with them during the last month's Pack meeting when we had promotion recognition.

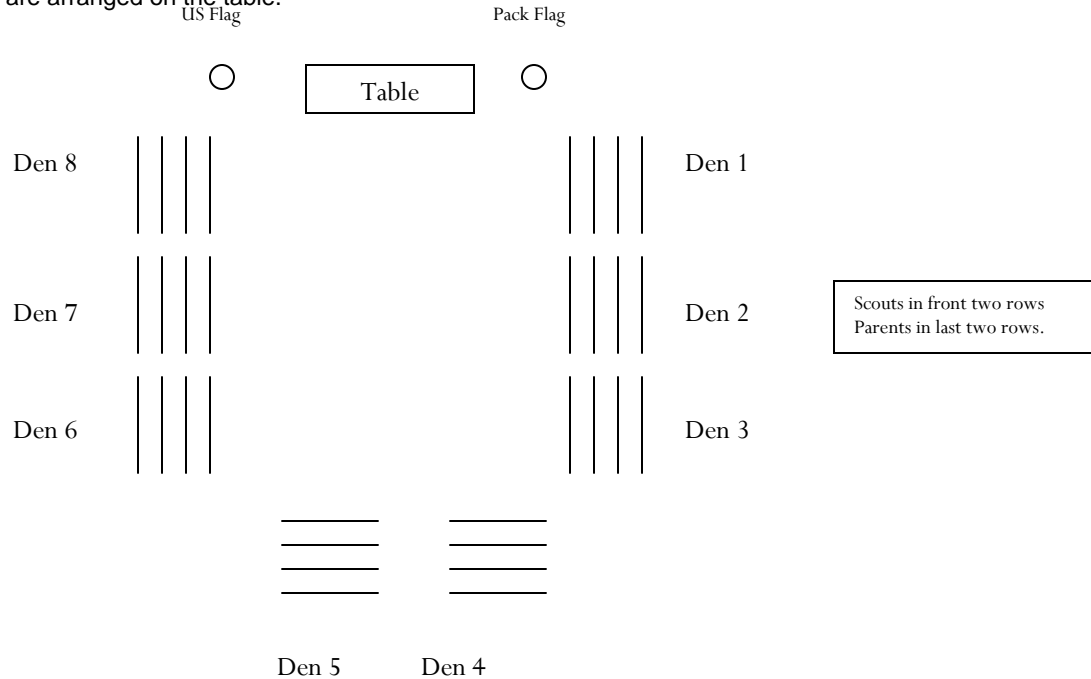

Room Organization: The physical arrangement of the room where the Pack Meetings are held is important. An arrangement allowing each den to set together as a group builds unity. Also consider a “U” shaped arrangement will maximize program efficiency and increase view ability by the participants (see figure below). The Cubmaster works from the front of the room where the awards are arranged on the table.



Den Assignments: Two Dens should be assigned special duties each month, and these duties rotated each month with each Den accomplishing each job at some point during the Scouting year. These Den assignments are termed the “Service Den” and “Program Den”.

The Service Den’s responsibility is to arrive early to the meeting location and set up the room, as described above. After the meeting, the Service Den resets the room to its original configuration. Large packs may want to assign two Dens.

The Program Den is responsible for Colors (flag ceremony). The Program Den marches the flags from the rear of the room to the front, posts the flags, and leads the Pack in the Pledge of Allegiance and the Scout Pledge. At the end of the Pack meeting the Program Den retires the colors. Large packs may want to assign two Dens, one for the opening and the other the closing.

Basic Meeting: There are three major parts to every meeting; a beginning, middle, and end. The Pack meeting should be planned for approximately one hour but no more than an hour and a half. It is difficult to keep the attention of this age group for an extended period of time. Plan each segment of your meeting for the average age of your group and allow 1 minute to 1 ½ minutes per year of the group’s average age. Each segment should be sufficiently different to re-engage the scout’s attention. For example one segment the scouts will be seated. The next they should stand or sing instead of listening. The idea is to mix it up to keep there attention.

It is important to establish the habit of starting the Pack Meeting on time and ending on time. It’s unfair to punish those who arrive on time by waiting for those who are late. Once the practice is established and maintained, the majority of the folks will arrive on time. The beginning of each meeting should include Colors, Cub Scout Pledge, a non-denominational prayer (Program Den responsibility), and a welcome statement. The welcome statement should include a brief description of the meeting’s agenda.

Can Cubs Scouts Go Camping (2001 AAC H&SC)

Overnight camping by Tiger, Wolf and Bear Dens is not approved except for Council operated and certified camping programs. A den or pack should not take boys of this age on BSA sanctioned trips except at Council sponsored events.

Webelos Scouts may go camping as a den or part of a pack activity, but the BSA has specific limitations on these trips. The scout must be under the direct supervision of his parent(s) or the parent of another scout who has no more than two Webelos Scout to look after. The same rules, restrictions and permits apply to Webelos Den camping activities as to BSA activities (See the "Guide to Safe Scouting")

How to beat Lyme disease (2002 AAC H&SC)

Lyme disease is a infection that occurs after a tick bite. Since it usually takes a day or two of the tick being attached to you before you get the Lyme Disease infection, the most important thing to do is to look for ticks regularly (daily) when you are out of doors. In the spring the tick is extremely small and if it is in the hair, it is easily missed, so look closely! Typically in the spring the tick is smaller than the head of a pin.

The first, and most typical finding of the infection is a skin rash that looks like a bulls eye or target.

The early other symptoms include feeling tired all the time, joint pains, headaches and fever.

After several weeks the heart may become infected and there is chest pain and "palpitations" (skipped heart beats or racing heart rate). When this happens, watch for signs that the brain and nerves are not working well. The infection can cause meningitis.

Treatment of Lyme Disease requires an antibiotic given by a doctor. If you think you have the infection, see a doctor quickly! Like any infection, Lyme Disease may reoccur and if you don't take all of the antibiotic, you may not be cured.

Removing Ticks (2002 AAC H&SC)

If you find a tick it should be removed as soon as possible. Do not burn the tick with a match or alcohol, either of which may kill the tick before removal. Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull steadily and gently away from the skin. After the tick is out, disinfect the area by washing the area and using a disinfectant. Watch the site of the tick bite for the characteristic "target" rash.

The middle of the meeting takes the majority of the time allotment and should be divided into at least two parts or perhaps more with each part having appropriate segments. The first major part is presenting the awards. By den, call each scout forward and present him with his award. Of course each award should be described so the parents and grandparents know what was achieved.

Part two is the theme for the month. For example if this is the month of October with Halloween just around the corner, perhaps you have a guest storyteller spin an appropriate spooky tale. Or with elections in early November, invite a local politician to talk to the scouts about the importance of voting and the particulars of his office. It's good for the adults too.

The closing includes announcements like when the next Pack meeting is scheduled, then the Cubmaster gives a Cubmaster minute. The Cubmaster's minute is a short object lesson. Then have the Program Den retire the colors, and the meeting is over with a "Goodnight Scout" salutation from the Cubmaster.

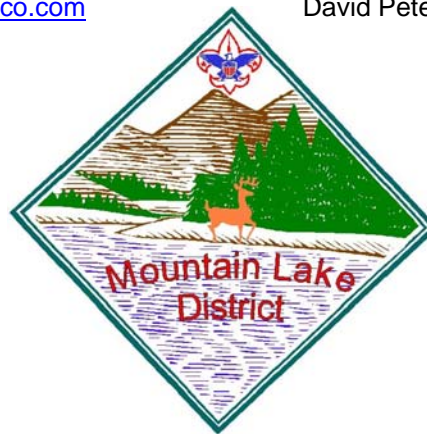
